**Vanessa Agard-Jones** is an assistant professor of Anthropology at Columbia University. Her current book project, *Body Burdens: Toxic Endurance and Decolonial Desire* uses ethnographic research to explore pesticides, sexual politics, and postcoloniality in Martinique. She analyzes the physical toll of toxins on the body as well as the metaphorical toxicity of colonialism in a post-colonial political context.
